State, County, Military Fear for Selfridge Base Jobs

Would it be less than cliché to declare that the future of the 107th Fighter Squadron at Selfridge Air National Guard Base is, well, up in the air?

The entire Pentagon is facing budget cuts and one of them has seemingly named the 107th Fighter Wing, which just returned from Afghanistan to SANG in Harrison Township. The 107th Fighter Squadron is part of the Air Guard's 127th Wing, all based at Selfridge.

Two developments of late on that. One is that U.S. Congresswoman Candice Miller has already met with Air Force officials about cutting the 107th, and two, the adjutant general of Michigan's Army and Air National Guard spoke at SANG recently to fill in the blanks for concerned airmen and flight crews whose jobs are at stake.

First, U.S. Rep. Miller issued the following statement about the situation at Selfridge:

While I am pleased that the Air Force plans to add four KC-135 refueling aircraft to the 127th Wing of the Michigan Air National Guard, I remain very concerned about the impact that the loss of the 24 A-10 Ground Attack aircraft currently based at Selfridge ANGB will have on the base," she said.

"A net loss of 20 aircraft at the base will certainly mean a loss of jobs and will diminish the overall scope of the mission of the Michigan Air National Guard. After the 2005 Base Closure and Realignment (BRAC) round, the Air Force spent a great deal of money moving the A-10 mission to Selfridge ANGB and the members of 107th squadron have performed incredibly well in support of American ground forces on battlefields in both Iraq and most recently in Afghanistan.

'My concern also extends to if there is just one mission at Selfridge ANGB then that will make the base more vulnerable if the Pentagon is successful in achieving the expected two upcoming BRAC rounds in 2013 and 2015. I am interested in hearing more from the Air Force to justify these decisions.

Michigan delegation to support Squadron and its various supthe men and women of Michigan's Air National Guard and continuing to advocate going forward to strengthen the mission at Selfridge ANGB so it can continue to be a critical component of our national defense.'

That said, Maj. Gen. Gregory J. Vadnais spoke to air crews at Selfridge recently about these same concerns.

Vadnais, the adjutant general of Michigan's Army and Air National Guard, is seeking to maintain the current levels of personnel, aircraft and mission assignments in Michigan - possibly seeking to grow those numbers - even in the face of overall declines in the nation's military spending.

"Put simply, it makes the most economic sense for our nation to put more of its resources into the National Guard, rather than the active duty force," the general said during a Feb. 17 news conference at the base proper.

During the news conference, the general pointed out that the total cost of operating a squadron of 24 A-10 Thunderbolt II attack aircraft in an Air National Guard unit is about \$26 million per year. The same squadron in an active duty Air Force unit costs about \$52 million per year - almost exactly twice as much.

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porting elements, is scheduled to be eliminated as part of an Air Force plan to reduce the number of A-10s in the overall inventory.

That plan, along with a plan to eliminate a squadron of cargo aircraft slated to locate at a base in Battle Creek, Mich., will eliminate about 630 jobs in the Michigan Air National Guard about a quarter of the total positions in the organization.

"The loss of the A-10 squadron at Selfridge Air National Guard Base would be detrimental to the entire area," said Macomb County Executive Mark Hackel, one of several lo-

Detroit Names New CEO of DDOT, Adds 46 Buses

DDOT, the Detroit Dept. of Transportation, got a doubledose of good news last week and both initiatives probably couldn't have arrived at a better time for the challenged public transportation hub.

City officials including Mayor Dave Bing introduced 46 new fuel efficient buses last week and that figures to help plug a defecit in running reliable bus fleet service for DDOT.

And the second announcement was that there is a new sheriff in town, so to speak the city has appointed veteran transportation executive Ron Freeland as DDOT's new chief executive officer (CEO).

"I'm pleased to announce two new arrivals that will enhance our Dept. of Transportation services . . .to our riders,' Mayor Bing said in an announcement at the DDOT Shoemaker Terminal on the city's east side, on St. Jean St. near I-94 and Conner.

"The first new arrival is Ron Freeland, who has accepted our invitation to become the new CEO of DDOT. Ron has decades of experience running complex transportation systems in the United States and we're lucky to have him here."
