Some research among my 1960s Hot Rod magazine collection reveals that the 1962 Shelby Cobra Dragonsnake played an important part in drag racing history.

Reads one such track observation from Hot Rod:

The Cobra Dragonsnake is such an animal. Off the line in a nose-high attitude, Cure-Ride 50-50s locked in position, the Anglo-American azure sportster issued its first challenge at the HRM Championship Drags, going on to clip both ends of the NHRA A/Stock Sports record with 116.27 mph in 11.81 seconds," it says.

"Later, Ed Terry grasped the reins of the Shelby American sizzler, tracking class rivals to their lairs on a country-wide tour, and turned them back at every meeting.

More history on the car provided by Conceptcarz describes the significance it had on mid-1960s drag racing.

"Since the Shelby Cobras had already laid waste to much of the field in sports car racing, it was time for new competition," the history reads.

"And in 1964, what better way was there than to focus on the 1/4-mile – thus was born the 'Dragonsnake.'

"A few Shelby employees asked their boss to provide a 289 Cobra that they could drag race. Chassis number CSX2019 was designated as a public-relations car. It was already a movie star, so to speak, appearing in the movie, "Viva Las Vegas" with Elvis Presley and Ann-Margret.

"According to Shelby

looked after the chassis, while Ralph Falconer, Jr., was tasked with tuning the motors. The two dominated the competition, with a best quarter-mile result of 11.73 seconds at 119.20 mph, an AA/SP class record in the AHRA.'

Shelby combined a lightweight aluminum body that was made at AC in England together with a Ford Hi-Po 289 engine. The Shelby Cobra, meant for both road and track, was an immediate success.

The Shelby Cobra intended for the drag strip was dubbed the dragonsnake. Driver Kirkpatrick and mechanic Falconer dominated the A/SP class and was responsible for setting many records," the Conceptcarz history further reads.

One of the tricks that the Dragonsnake team used to generate higher performance was that the valve pockets had been relieved in Dragonsnake to permit freer breathing.

Point being that Carroll Shelby wasn't just a Mustang modifier. He had a tremendous impact on drag racing and that shouldn't be forgotten as the hosannas continue to pour in

Grand Prix Now Offers Belle Isle Ferry For Fans to Go from River to the Race

It what promises to be yet another fun sports-related ritual in Detroit, Belle Isle Grand Prix race organizers have initiated water ferry service to transport fans from the RenCen/Port Authority riverfront over to Belle Isle for the races.

That is to say, fans who want to enjoy the beauty of the Detroit River will be able to take the scenic route to the fastest weekend of the summer with the new ferry service to Belle Isle announced last week by the Chevrolet Detroit Belle Isle Grand Prix.

As the Grand Prix returns for the first time in four years, June 1-3, event attendees will be able to enjoy a service that has never been offered before in the history of the race in Detroit.

The Grand Prix will provide a ferry shuttle service that will run from the Detroit Port Authority, located along Atwater on the Riverwalk adjacent to the GM RenCen, over to the Harbormaster Station at Belle Isle Park during race weekend.

The ferry service will begin at 7 a.m. Friday-Sunday and will leave from the Port Authority dock every hour on the hour.

The trip to Belle Isle is expected to take approximately 20 minutes and will allow ferrygoers the opportunity to enjoy the picturesque scenery of the Detroit and Windsor, Ontario, Canada, riverfronts along the way. Return trips from Belle Isle back to the Port Authority will depart on the half-hour from the Harbormaster station, located next to the MacArthur Bridge to Belle Isle. The ferry, which holds about 70 people, will operate until 9 p.m. each night of the Grand Prix.

With no on-island parking available for race attendees during the weekend, the ferry provides another transportation alternative for Grand Prix attendees, in addition to the shuttle bus service that will carry all others on to Belle Isle.

The cost of the ferry service will be \$10 for a round-trip ticket for adults and \$5 for children 12 and under - the same prices as the shuttle bus transportation.
